【Special Feature】 How to dispose of your garbage in Yokohama City!

The rules for disposing of garbage are different by country. They also depend on the region in Japan. The following rules are for residents of Yokohama City.

1. Place where you can put out your garbage

Please dispose of your garbage at the garbage-collection points.

They are called “SHUSEKI BASHO” in Japanese.



2. Date and time you can put out your garbage

Put garbage out on the proper collection days of the week, depending on the type of garbage.

The days on which you put garbage out are posted at the garbage collection sites.

Please dispose of garbage by 8:00 AM on the collection day.

※If you put garbage out on a different day or the night before collection day, the crows will come and scatter them. Please follow the rules and use them cleanly.

3. Separating your garbage before putting it out

What is the Japanese event “Shichi-Go-San” ?

“Shichi-Go-San” is a traditional Japanese event that celebrates the growth of children. It is held around November 15th, and it is a ceremony to pray to the deities for the healthy growth of children. Boys at the ages of 3 and 5 and girls at the ages of 3 and 7 visit Japanese shrines. There is an event called “Let’s Wear a Kimono” once a month at Tsurumi International Lounge. Adults and children can wear kimonos for free at this event.

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
